The Pastor's Page

As I participated this past week in the annual gathering of Susquehanna Conference pastors and laity, there was a delegation from another church who sat behind me in the auditorium. From time to time, they broke out in loud conversation, oblivious to the distraction they were causing, or to what was being shared by our Bishop, Jeremiah Park, or whoever happened to be speaking from the platform at that time. Most of the time, their loud conversation was not relevant to what was being discussed, nor was it brief. I will admit that it was, at least for me, a HUGE distraction. As they continued to talk, and as I began running possible scenarios in my mind as to the best way to deal with this distraction, I was reminded of an article shared by our District Superintendent, Barry Robison. Here is an excerpt from that article...

As the minister began the funeral message, a little child's voice carried clearly from the back corner of the sanctuary throughout the rest of the room. So did the mother's increasingly frantic attempts to quiet her child. There was very little chance that no one in the room hadn't heard either the child or the mother. It was definitely a distraction.

Those of us in attendance had a choice to make. How much of our attention would we let the distraction claim? Several people in front of me chose to give their attention to the distraction by turning to see what was going on. As they did I was suddenly struck with the thought of how useless and futile such an action on their part was.

What difference did it make if they could see who was making the noise? It's not like they would be called upon to pick out the offenders in a police lineup. What did they hope to accomplish by shooting stern looks of disapproval to the back? The child wouldn't notice or care, and the mother was already painfully aware of the disruption her child was causing.

With those thoughts in my head, I chose instead to refocus my attention on the minister and increase my efforts to concentrate on what was being preached up front, rather than on the commotion taking place behind me. It took some effort, but I was able to block out the distraction so that I could hear the Word of God through the minister.

Satan is a master at creating distractions and diversions that steal our attention away from the presence and message of God. Some distractions are large in scope. One example is the current human sexuality debate within our denomination. As important as it is, nevertheless it has distracted many by stealing time, energy and resources, not to mention confidence, away from the joyful and focused work of the people of God to reach others for Christ and make disciples of Jesus.

Other distractions are more subtle. Concerns over dwindling numbers of people and shrinking finances can distract us as congregations into concentrating more on ourselves and our survival than on giving ourselves away for Christ.

Like the people at that funeral, we have a choice to make. It takes some effort, but in both the obvious and subtle things affecting our lives today, *we can choose* to keep our eyes, ears, and attention focused on God, rather than yield to Satan's attempts to distract us from God and our work for God...

As I read and reflect on this story once more, I am struck by the fact that all around us, even within our own church family, there are very different perceptions, and very different responses to the challenges and distractions we face. Although the child didn't see their actions - in this case their talking - as distracting, others most certainly did. Although the mother was surely mortified at her child's behavior, others were willing to consider the source, and the circumstances, and to extend her some grace. And although some were agitated enough to turn and glare, others were able to imagine themselves in those same circumstances, and chose instead to turn a deaf ear, and re-focus their attention to embrace what really mattered more in the moment - a word of encouragement in the midst of loss.

There are times that we don't always make the best choices in life. But thanks be to God that we belong to a church family that is willing to look past our shortcomings - both perceived and real - and extend to us a measure of grace. Those are the true marks of Christian Love. It is what Jesus would have us to do.

So, let me encourage you to make a conscious effort to turn aside from the distractions in your life, and focus your attention on the One who can help you find joy and fulfillment in life - both in your work, and in your play. Know that you have an important part to play in God's plan, and that God can and will use you mighty ways -*IF* you are willing to allow Him to do so.

I look forward to seeing what the next chapter of our life together holds, as we seek out and explore God's calling for Grace Church together.



COMMITTEE ON FINANCE

In order to better communicate the financial needs of the church, the finance committee has decided to include a monthly section on church finances.

At her passing in August of 2012, Ms. Mary Koppenhaver left Grace church a generous gift of \$175,000. With those funds, the sanctuary was re-carpeted, the walls and ceilings in both the chapel and the sanctuary were repaired and painted, new pews were installed, a new sound booth was constructed, new equipment added, and most recently, the bathrooms located at the main entrance were renovated and made handicapped accessible.

All this was possible because of Mary's great love for Jesus, and for the people of Grace Church.

More recently, we have received \$10,000 from the estate of Dottie Troutman, and \$30,000 from the estate of George and Jo Wilt. Those gifts have been deposited with the Stewardship Foundation of the United Methodist Church for use sometime in the future.

However, we inhabit a church building that is now 35 years old, and our Family Life Center, once new, has recently celebrated its 20th birthday. We have also recently discovered that it is in need of some roof repairs, and new shingles.

Our Parsonage is also in need of some repairs and renovations, which we will be sharing about in the near future.

As you make plans to travel and vacation for the summer months, please don't forget to remember to honor God with your tithes and offerings.

Throwing a punch in a schoolyard fight nearly caused Ernesto to be expelled from school. It wasn't the first time



that the pre-teen had gotten into trouble at his school in Mazatan, Mexico. If one of the boys at school taunted him by taking his backpack, or calling him names, Ernesto would strike back. Then one day he received an Operation Christmas Child shoebox gift from a church. The shoebox contained a variety of school supplies, hygiene items, and toys - including a soccer ball with pump. Ernesto was thrilled to have his own ball. "I was so excited when I saw the school supplies in the gift because most of mine were broken or used up," Ernesto said. "They helped me improve my grades." Not only did his shoebox's school supplies help him with his homework, the soccer ball would play a key part in Ernesto's discipleship as a new believer in Jesus Christ. As Ernesto participated in our follow-up discipleship program for shoebox recipients, The Greatest Journey, he learned more about how to follow Jesus and tell his family and friends about Him. Ernesto, now 12 years old, still uses the ball he received in his shoebox gift as an avenue to talk with his peers about Jesus. Ernesto's mother has also accepted Christ as her savior because of his testimony.

Welcoming Is the Top Factor in Church Choice

A survey of spiritual "seekers" released in 2018 found that the top motivators for considering a church are knowing that everyone will be welcomed (32%), making friends and nurturing friendships (29%), support during difficult times (28%), and learning more about God (27%). Less motivating are opportunities for Bible study, volunteer opportunities, discussions of issues and topics, and the provision of childcare.

These findings point to a desire for genuine community. About three-quarters of those who might visit a church said that having friendly and welcoming people might cause them to continue attending.

Among survey respondents, women were more interested in being welcomed into a church and in relationships that might develop, while men were relatively more interested in knowledge about God. About one in three said they do not believe church has anything to offer them. Enjoyable sermons and insightful teaching rank high as attractive church characteristics among both men and women, and these characteristics were twice as likely to be named as motivators than worship experience.

What do spiritual seekers spend their time doing?

Two-thirds spend free time at restaurants and coffee houses, especially high-income earners and those without children, while parents are more often found at parks. Prayer is the most common spiritual activity, practiced daily or weekly by 48 percent of respondents, followed by spending quiet time alone reflecting on spiritual life and spending time reflecting in nature. More than 90 percent use smartphones and internet daily, while 83 percent use social media every day and about half watch TV or listen to radio.

"This data provides insights into how and where churches can connect with people who may be looking for a faith community where they can belong," said Krause.

The survey was conducted in November 2017 by the Barna Group and included people aged 25-49 who consider themselves spiritual, socially conscious, and seeking meaning in their lives, but who are not affiliated with a church.
